How to Improve ICANN Meetings

A Community View

The ICANNWiki.org community has offered a list of suggestions for making ICANN meetings more productive.

No Remote Locations

As much as we may enjoy meetings in places like Mar del Plata and Wellington, locations that require an in-country transfer should not be on the ICANN meetings calendar. The meetings are long enough without making the travel even harder. ICANN might consider holding all of its meetings in a handful of standard locations with international airports (Amsterdam, Frankfurt, London, New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Tokyo, Singapore, Sydney, etc.).

Fewer Presentations, No Reading

The Royal Reading of the Reports should end. If a report or powerpoint slide has been prepared, then post it to the website. If it's done in advance of the meeting, I'll read it on my way here. If it's done at the meeting, I'll read it on my way home.

On a related matter the ICANN "public forum" has come to be entirely dominated by reports, with little time left for public input. The reports seem to go on and on, but contributions are often excluded for lack of time. Reporting may be needed, and public comment on reports should always be allowed; however a reasonable timeslot should be made available for public comment, regardless of the time allocated to reporting.

Publish the Transcription as a Live Feed

Helpful for people listening in on poor lines or who are deaf. Helpful when the

sound or video drops out of the remote feed, as it often does.

At APNIC meetings, live transcripts are fed directly into Jabber. It works well!

Foster Thoughtful Dialogue

We should find a way to foster thoughtful dialogue among various parts of the ICANN community. Esther Dyson, for example, is really good at this. At PC Forum every year, Esther assembles panels of people with different interests or different perspectives to talk with her about a common theme. They sit on the stage, around a coffee table, and chat. Esther leads the discussion, but it's not a series of presentations, it's a dialogue. It's more interesting than presentations and just as informative. She does these in 1:30 hour blocks of time. 45 minutes for a moderated chat and 45 minutes that includes participation from the audience. It works well.

Cut the staged presentations altogether. Instead of the chair passing a mic to Board members to read pre-written and -decided resolutions, make the Board talk with its constituencies and interested onlookers. Even encourage the Board to break up and travel as individuals to other groups' meetings.

Convene more subject-oriented meetings where we could get real questions answered. The Board claims to have technical or policy questions on which they'd like public input; the non-Board has plenty of process questions.

More Effective Remote Participation

ICANN should insist that Board members select one meeting per year to participate remotely. ICANN would change within a year. This is especially important as the real dialogue between the community and the Board has moved out of the public forum and into the individual meetings with constituencies and Supporting Organizations. None of these are webcast, podcast, or transcribed. As a result, people participating from home get a skewed view of what is happening on the ground.

Shorten the Meetings

A day on each end of the meeting for travel, plus seven days on the ground for the meeting is ridiculous. Let's figure out a way to do half of the meeting online (e.g., dispense with the reading of the reports). Let's use the Vancouver and Wellington meetings as test cases and look back over the agenda to see what we could have done online in advance of the meeting. We need the constituency time, the working meetings of the SO councils, and the individual meetings with the Board. We also need about three hours for an open mic, with nothing on the agenda except open discussion. I'll bet we can get it down to four days.

Board members should join the queue

During the public forum, it is common for many board members to respond to each individual comment from the floor, even when they have little value to add to the group as a whole. It would be preferable that more time be given to comments from the floor, and that board member responses are limited to those who have something specific to say or add on the given topic.

Don't Bar Anonymous Meeting Participants

It came to ALAC's attention after the meeting that participants who chose not to give a name were not permitted to enter. This should not be ICANN policy. Although more weight may naturally be given to the input of those who identify themselves (especially if their identities give context to their comments), no one should be denied entry to the venue based on the choice not to give a name.

ICANN Marrakech June 26th-30th, 2006

ICANN approves .tel TLD

ICANN has approved the .tel TLD, paving the way for its use worldwide as a telephone directory TLD. For example, Apple could continue to use www.apple.com as its main site, but opt to use www.apple.tel as its support, public relations, and customer service listing. Another use for .tel could be in the mobile space, as companies wishing to make their contact info more accessible to mobile users could publicize "domain.tel" as a way to reach them from a smartphone.

A distribution contract for the new TLD was awarded to London-based Telnic.

The new TLD will be available in 2007.

ICANN rejects .XXX TLD

ICANN's Board of Directors voted against a proposed agreement for a .XXX. Sponsored Top Level Domain (sTLD). The application was proposed by the ICM Registry.

The application has received much public comment and detailed discussion by the ICANN Board. Reflecting the diversity of views this application has generated, the Board discussion at today's meeting focused on the criteria for the sTLD, especially for sponsorship, and the terms of the contract proposed by ICM, including compliance issues related to key terms associated with public policy concerns. ICM had proposed additional terms in response to issues raised by ICANN's Governmental Advisory Committee, particularly at ICANN's meeting in Wellington in March.

ICM had requested that the ICANN Board vote on the proposed contract at this meeting.

ICANN's Board voted 9 to 5 against the proposed agreement. Votes in favor of the proposed .XXX Registry Agreement were cast by the following Board Members: Veni Markovski, Susan Crawford, Peter Dengate Thrush, Joichi Ito, and Mouhamet Diop. Directors who voted against the approval were Vint Cerf (Chairman), Alejandro Pisanty (Vice-Chairman), Raimundo Beca, Demi Getschko, Hagen Hultsch, Njeri Rionge, Vanda Scartezini, Paul Twomey (President and CEO), and Hualin Qian.

Peer to Patent via Wiki

It's tough for the USPTO to get up to speed in all areas for which patent applications are sent to them. That probably has something to do with why they are so backed up and often have to rubber stamp applications without a more in depth review. To address this problem, the USPTO has launched a pilot program called "Peer to Patent" which employs the JotSpot wiki engine. The idea is to open up the review process and invite the community to help dig up prior art and provide other assistance to the examiners.

If this takes off, it would be a major change to current patent system — which does need an overhaul. I can imagine that people will game the system and that it will take time to work out the kinks. But that is true with any new system. In the long run, moving from a slow bureaucratic environment to a more collectively governed situation is an important change in thinking which can only propel us in the right direction.

Pharming

DNS Cache poisoning

DNS Cache poisoning is an attack where a name server is tricked into adding or modifying cached DNS data with incorrect and malicious data. There are several forms of DNS (cache) poisoning. One attack that is recently causing problems is associated with phishing and is called pharming.

Dave Piscitello wrote a helpful and entertaining article on how DNS cache poisoning is related to Pharming, subtitled Someone's poisoned the water hole!

An excerpt from the article appears below, with a link to the complete work:

If you have children, you'll probably recall the pull-string figure Wild West Woody from the Pixar movie, Toy Story. Among the handful of fun phrases Woody would say when you pulled his string were, "There's a snake in my boot!" and "Someone's poisoned the water hole!" If Hasbro were to release a "virtual" Woody today, he'd warn us of a similarly serious threat, DNS cache poisoning. The analogy is simple: in the Wild West, a poisoned well spelled disaster; on the Internet, a poisoned DNS cache is no less a calamity.

This increased visibility is turning ICANNWiki into a hub for the wider ICANN community. We are pleased with these initial results and look forward to taking the wiki to a whole new level at the Marrakesh meeting.

Adding hundreds of people, companies, and groups into the Wiki takes time. The Wiki education process is particularly time intensive. A primary ongoing goal is to talk with and add those we have missed at the previous meetings.

Additionally, we have shifted attention to the development of other collaborative content such as session notes and topical discussions so that the Wiki becomes an ever more valuable repository of information that helps ICANN better achieve its goals. The benefit is not only to those that attend the conference as a way to look back at what was covered, but also as a reporting mechanism to those that are unable to attend the conference.

This project is completely dependent on sponsorship to cover expenses. Taking into account travel for three-four people, caricatures, booth rental, printed materials and equipment, total out of pocket costs will be approximately \$35,000.
